## Chapter 2

Motherboard information

## 2.1 Before you proceed

Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.



#### CAUTION!


- Unplug the power cord from the wall socket before touching any component.
- Before handling components, use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safely grounded object or a metal object, such as the power supply case, to avoid damaging them due to static electricity.
- Hold components by the edges to avoid touching the ICs on them.
- Whenever you uninstall any component, place it on a grounded antistatic pad or in the bag that came with the component.
- Before you install or remove any component, ensure that the ATX power supply is switched off or the power cord is detached from the power supply. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to the motherboard, peripherals, or components.

## 2.2 Motherboard layout



**NOTE:** Place eight screws into the holes indicated by circles to secure the motherboard to the chassis.


**CAUTION!** Do not overtighten the screws! Doing so can damage the motherboard.










## 2.4 Central Processing Unit (CPU)

The motherboard comes with a surface mount LGA1151 socket designed for the Intel® 6th Generation Core™ i7 / Core™ i5 / Core™ i3, Pentium® and Celeron® 14nm processors.





**IMPORTANT:** Unplug all power cables before installing the CPU.





#### CAUTION!


- Upon purchase of the motherboard, ensure that the PnP cap is on the socket and the socket contacts are not bent. Contact your retailer immediately if the PnP cap is missing, or if you see any damage to the PnP cap/socket contacts/motherboard components. The manufacturer will shoulder the cost of repair only if the damage is shipment/transit-related.
- Keep the cap after installing the motherboard. The manufacturer will process Return Merchandise Authorization (RMA) requests only if the motherboard comes with the cap on the LGA1151 socket.
- The product warranty does not cover damage to the socket contacts resulting from incorrect CPU installation/removal, or misplacement/loss/ incorrect removal of the PnP cap.

## 2.4.1 Installing the CPU

**CAUTION!** Ensure that you install the correct CPU designed for LGA 1151 only. DO NOT install a CPU designed for LGA1155 and LGA1156 sockets on the LGA1150 socket.










### To uninstall the CPU heatsink and fan assembly






## 2.5 System memory


This motherboard comes with four Double Data Rate 4 (DDR4) Dual Inline Memory Module (DIMM) sockets. A DDR4 module is notched differently from a DDR, DDR2, or DDR3 module. DO NOT install a DDR, DDR2, or DDR3 memory module to the DDR4 slot.





According to Intel<sup>®</sup> CPU spec, DIMM voltage below 1.2 V is recommended to protect the CPU.




IMBM-Q170A 288-pin DDR4 DIMM sockets









## 2.6 Jumpers

#### 1. Clear RTC RAM (CLRTC)

This jumper allows you to clear the Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM in CMOS. You can clear the CMOS memory of system setup parameters by erasing the CMOS RTC RAM data. The onboard button cell battery powers the RAM data in CMOS, which include system setup information such as system passwords.

#### To erase the RTC RAM:

- 1. Turn OFF the computer and unplug the power cord.
- 2. Move the jumper cap from pins 1-2 (default) to pins 2-3. Keep the cap on pins 2-3 for about 5~10 seconds, then move the cap back to pins 1-2.
- 3. Plug the power cord and turn ON the computer.
- 4. Hold down the **<Del>** key during the boot process and enter BIOS setup to reenter data.



**CAUTION!** Except when clearing the RTC RAM, never remove the cap on CLRTC jumper default position. Removing the cap will cause system boot failure!




#### NOTES:

- If the steps above do not help, remove the onboard battery and move the jumper again to clear the CMOS RTC RAM data. After clearing the CMOS, reinstall the battery.
- You do not need to clear the RTC when the system hangs due to overclocking. For system failure due to overclocking, use the CPU Parameter Recall (C.P.R) feature. Shut down and reboot the system so the BIOS can automatically reset parameter settings to default values.

#### 2. Chassis intrusion connector (4-1 pin CHASSIS)

This connector is for a chassis-mounted intrusion detection sensor or switch. Connect one end of the chassis intrusion sensor or switch cable to this connector. The chassis intrusion sensor or switch sends a high-level signal to this connector when a chassis component is removed or replaced. The signal is then generated as a chassis intrusion event.


By default, the pin labeled "Chassis Signal" and "Ground" are shorted with a jumper cap. Remove the jumper caps only when you intend to use the chassis intrusion detection feature.



## 2.7 Onboard LEDs


#### 1. Standby Power LED

The motherboard comes with two standby power LEDs that light up to indicate that the system is ON, in sleep mode or in soft-off mode. This is a reminder that you should shut down the system and unplug the power cable before removing or plugging in any motherboard component. The illustration below shows the location of the onboard LEDs.



## 2.8 Connectors

## 2.8.1 Rear panel connectors



- 1. PS/2 keyboard/mouse port (purple/green). This port is for a PS/2 keyboard or mouse.
- 2. HDMI port. This port is for a High-Definition Multimedia Interface (HDMI) connector, and is HDCP compliant allowing playback of HD DVD, Blu-ray, and other protected content.
- Serial port (COM1). This port connects a modem, or other devices that conform with serial specification. This serial port also supports RS-232 / RS-422 / RS-485 connections.

- 5. Line In port (light blue). This port connects the tape, CD, DVD player, or other audio sources.
- 6. Line Out port (lime). This port connects to a headphone or a speaker. In a 4-channel, 6-channel and 8-channel configurations, the function of this port becomes Front Speaker Out.
- 7. Microphone port (pink). This port connects a microphone.
- 8. USB 3.0 ports (USB3). These 9-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports connect to USB 3.0/2.0 devices.




#### NOTES:

- The XHCI (USB3.0) controller is not natively supported under Windows® 7 OS. Use a P/S2 or SATA device during OS installation.
- Due to USB 3.0 controller limitations, USB 3.0 devices can only be used under a Windows<sup>®</sup> OS environment and after USB 3.0 driver installation.
- USB 3.0 devices can only be used for data storage.
- We strongly recommend that you connect USB 3.0 devices to USB 3.0 ports for faster and better performance for your USB 3.0 devices.
- **9. DVI-I port.** This port is for any DVI-D compatible device or VGA port through an inverter.

## 2.8.2 Internal connectors

#### 1. ATX power connectors (24-pin EATX\_PWR1, 8-pin EATX\_PWR2)

These connectors are for ATX power supply plugs. The power supply plugs are designed to fit these connectors in only one orientation. Find the proper orientation and push down firmly until the connectors completely fit.



IMBM-Q170A ATX power connectors




#### **IMPORTANT:**

- For a fully configured system, we recommend that you use a power supply unit (PSU) that complies with ATX 12 V Specification 2.0 (or later version) and provides a minimum power of 330W.
- We recommend that you use a PSU with higher power output when configuring a system with more power-consuming devices. The system may become unstable or may not boot up if the power is inadequate.

#### 2. TPM connector (20-1 pin TPM1)


This connector supports a Trusted Platform Module (TPM) system, which can securely store keys, digital certificates, passwords, and data. A TPM system also helps enhance network security, protects digital identities, and ensures platform integrity.

#### 3. CPU and chassis fan connectors (4-pin CPU\_FAN1, 4-pin CHA\_FAN1~2)

Connect the fan cables to the fan connectors on the motherboard, ensuring that the black wire of each cable matches the ground pin of the connector.






**CAUTION:** Do not forget to connect the fan cables to the fan connectors. Insufficient air flow inside the system may damage the motherboard components. These are not jumpers! Do not place jumper caps on the fan connectors!



**NOTE:** The CPU\_FAN connector supports a CPU fan of maximum 12V/2A fan rating.

#### 4. BIOS programmable connector (8-pin SPI1)


Use this connector to flash the BIOS ROM.

#### 5. System panel connector (10-1 pin F\_PANEL1)

This connector supports several chassis-mounted functions.

#### • System power LED (2-pin PWR\_LED)

This 2-pin connector is for the system power LED. Connect the chassis power LED cable to this connector. The system power LED lights up when you turn on the system power, and blinks when the system is in sleep mode.

#### • Hard disk drive activity LED (2-pin HDD\_LED)

This 2-pin connector is for the HDD Activity LED. Connect the HDD Activity LED cable to this connector. The HDD LED lights up or flashes when data is read from or written to the HDD.

#### • ATX power button/soft-off button (2-pin PWR\_BTN)


This 2-pin connector is for the system power button.

#### Reset button (2-pin RESET)

This 2-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted reset button for system reboot without turning off the system power.

#### 6. Digital I/O connector (10-pin DIO1)


This connector includes 8 I/O lines (In/Out programmable). All of the Digital I/O lines are programmable and each I/O pin can be individually programmed to support various devices.



IMBM-Q170A Digitial I/O connector


#### 7. Serial port connectors (10-1 pin COM2~6)

These connectors are for serial (COM) ports. Connect the serial port module cables to these connectors, then install the module to a slot opening at the back of the system chassis.



#### 8. Serial ATA 6.0Gb/s connector (7-pin SATA6G\_1~6)

These connectors connect to Serial ATA 6.0 Gb/s hard disk drives via Serial ATA 6.0 Gb/s signal cables.





#### NOTES:

- You must install Windows<sup>®</sup> 7 before using Serial ATA hard disk drives.
- When using hot-plug and NCQ, set the SATA Mode Selection item in the BIOS to [AHCI]. See section **3.3.3 SATA Configuration** for details.

#### 9. USB 2.0 connector (10-1 pin USB910)

These connector are for USB 2.0 ports. Connect the USB module cable to the connectors. These USB connectors comply with USB 2.0 specifications that supports up to 480 Mbps connection speed.






**CAUTION:** Never connect a 1394 cable to the USB connector. Doing so will damage the motherboard.

NOTE: The USB module cable is purchased separately.

#### 10. Speaker out connector (4-pin AMP\_CON1)

The 4-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted speaker.

# Chapter 3

**BIOS** setup

## 3.1 BIOS setup program

Use the BIOS Setup program to update the BIOS or configure its parameters. The BIOS screens include navigation keys and brief online help to guide you in using the BIOS Setup program.

#### **Entering BIOS Setup at startup**

#### To enter BIOS Setup at startup:

Press <Delete> during the Power-On Self Test (POST). If you do not press <Delete>, POST continues with its routine.

#### **Entering BIOS Setup after POST**

#### To enter BIOS Setup after POST:

- Press <Ctrl>+<Alt>+<Del> simultaneously.
- Press the reset button on the system chassis.
- Press the power button to turn the system off then back on. Do this option only if you failed to enter BIOS Setup using the first two options.



**NOTE:** Using the power button, reset button, or the <Ctrl>+<Alt>+<Del> keys to reboot a running operating system can cause damage to your data or system. Always shut down the system properly from the operating system.



#### **IMPORTANT:**

- The default BIOS settings for this motherboard apply to most working conditions and ensures optimal performance. If the system becomes unstable after changing any BIOS settings, load the default settings to regain system stability. Select the option Restore Defaults under the Save & Exit Menu. See section 3.7 Save & Exit.
- The BIOS setup screens shown in this section are for reference purposes only, and may not exactly match what you see on your screen.

## 3.1.1 BIOS menu screen

### 3.1.2 Menu bar

The menu bar on top of the screen has the following main items:

Main	For changing the basic system configuration.	
Advanced	For changing the advanced system settings.	
Chipset	For viewing and changing chipset settings.	
Security	For setting up BIOS security settings.	
Boot	For changing the system boot configuration.	
Save & Exit	For selecting the exit options and loading default settings.	

To select an item on the menu bar, press the right or left arrow key on the keyboard until the desired item is highlighted.

## 3.2 Main menu

The Main menu provides you an overview of the basic system information, and allows you to set the system date, time, language, and security settings.

## 3.2.1 System Date [Day MM/DD/YYYY]

Allows you to set the system date.

## 3.2.2 System Time [HH:MM:SS]

Allows you to set the system time.

## 3.3 Advanced menu

The Advanced menu items allow you to change the settings for the CPU and other system devices.



Be cautious when changing the settings of the Advanced menu items. Incorrect field values can cause the system to malfunction.

## 3.3.1 CPU Configuration

The items in this menu show CPU-related information the BIOS automatically detects.



The items shown in the submenu may be different depending on the type of CPU installed.

### Hyper-threading [Enabled]

The Intel Hyper-Threading Technology allows a hyper-threading processor to appear as two logical processors to the operating system, allowing the operating system to schedule two threads or processes simultaneously.

[Enabled]	Two threads per activated core are enabled.
[Disabled]	Only one thread per activated core is enabled.



Configuration options for active processor cores are dependent on the installed CPU.

#### Intel Virtualization Technology [Enabled]

[Enabled]Allows a hardware platform to run multiple operating<br/>systems separately and simultaneously, enabling one<br/>system to virtually function as several systems.[Disabled]Disables this function.

## 3.3.2 Trusted Computing

#### Security Device Support [Enable]

Allows you to enable or disable BIOS support for security devices. Configuration options: [Disable] [Enable]

#### Device Select [Auto]

Allows you to select the TPM device. Configuration options: [Auto] [TPM1.2] [TPM2.0]

#### 3.3.3 SATA Configuration

The BIOS automatically detects the presence of SATA devices. The Serial ATA Ports listed will display **Empty** if there are no Serial devices connected to the ports.

### SATA Controller(s) [Enabled]

Configuration options: [Enabled] [Disabled].



The following items appear only when you set SATA Controller(s) to [Enabled].

#### SATA Mode Selection [AHCI]

Allows you to set the SATA configuration.

[AHCI]	Set to [AHCI] when you want the SATA hard disk
	drives to use the AHCI (Advanced Host Controller
	Interface). The AHCI allows the onboard storage driver
	to enable advanced Serial ATA features that increases

#### Serial ATA Port 0, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5

The items in this menu allow you to change the Intel<sup>®</sup> Active Management Technology (AMT) feature.

#### Intel AMT [Enabled]

Allow you to enable or disable the Intel® Active Management Technology (AMT) in the BIOS extension. Configuration options: [Enabled] [Disabled]



iAMT H/W is always enabled. This option just controls the BIOS extension execution. If enabled, this requires additional firmware in the SPI device.
