Chapter 2

Motherboard information

2.1 Before you proceed

Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.



CAUTION!


- Unplug the power cord from the wall socket before touching any component.
- Before handling components, use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safely grounded object or a metal object, such as the power supply case, to avoid damaging them due to static electricity.
- Hold components by the edges to avoid touching the ICs on them.
- Whenever you uninstall any component, place it on a grounded antistatic pad or in the bag that came with the component.
- Before you install or remove any component, ensure that the power supply is switched off or the power cord is detached from the power supply. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to the motherboard, peripherals, or components.

2.2 Motherboard layout




NOTE: Place four screws into the holes indicated by circles to secure the motherboard to the chassis.

CAUTION! Do not overtighten the screws! Doing so can damage the motherboard.








2.4 Central Processing Unit (CPU)

The motherboard comes with an integrated $\mbox{Intel}^{\ensuremath{\texttt{0}}}$ Apollo Lake processor N4200/ N3350/E3930.



2.5 System memory

This motherboard comes with two Double Data Rate 3 Low Voltage (DDR3L) Small Outline Dual Inline Memory Modules (SO-DIMM) sockets. The figure illustrates the location of the DDR3L DIMM sockets:

2.6 Jumpers

1. Clear RTC RAM (3-pin CLRTC1)

This jumper allows you to clear the Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM in CMOS. You can clear the CMOS memory of date, time, and system setup parameters by erasing the CMOS RTC RAM data. The onboard button cell battery powers the RAM data in CMOS, which include system setup information such as system passwords.



EMB-APL1 Clear RTC RAM

To erase the RTC RAM:

- 1. Turn OFF the computer and unplug the power cord.
- 2. Move the jumper cap from pins 1-2 (default) to pins 2-3. Keep the cap on pins 2-3 for about 5~10 seconds, then move the cap back to pins 1-2.
- 3. Plug the power cord and turn ON the computer.
- 4. Hold down the **** key during the boot process and enter BIOS setup to reenter data.




CAUTION! Except when clearing the RTC RAM, never remove the cap on CLRTC jumper default position. Removing the cap will cause system boot failure!



NOTE: If the steps above do not help, remove the onboard battery and move the jumper again to clear the CMOS RTC RAM data. After clearing the CMOS, reinstall the battery.





6. Chassis intrusion jumper (4-1 pin CHASSIS1)

This connector is for a chassis-mounted intrusion detection sensor or switch. Connect one end of the chassis intrusion sensor or switch cable to this connector. The chassis intrusion sensor or switch sends a high-level signal to this connector when a chassis component is removed or replaced. The signal is then generated as a chassis intrusion event.

Move the jumper cap to pins 1-2 when you intend to use the chassis intrusion detection feature.



2.7 Connectors

2.7.1 Rear panel connectors



- 1. DC power port. This port connects to a DC power adapter.
- HDMI port. This port is for a High-Definition Multimedia Interface (HDMI) connector, and is HDCP compliant allowing playback of HD DVD, Blu-Ray, and other protected content.
- 3. Video Graphics Adapter (VGA) port. This 15-pin port is for a VGA monitor or other VGA-compatible devices.
- 4. USB 3.0 ports. These 9-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports connect to USB 3.0/2.0 devices.



NOTES:

- DO NOT connect a keyboard / mouse to any USB 3.0 port when installing Windows[®] operating system.
- Due to USB 3.0 controller limitation, USB 3.0 devices can only be used under Windows[®] OS environment and after the USB 3.0 driver installation.
- We strongly recommend that you connect USB 3.0 devices to USB 3.0 ports for faster and better performance for your USB 3.0 devices.
- 5. USB 2.0 ports. These two 4-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports are available for connecting USB 2.0/1.1 devices.
- LAN (RJ-45) ports. These ports allow Gigabit connection to a Local Area Network (LAN) through a network hub. Refer to the table below for the LAN port LED indications.



- 7. Microphone port (pink). This port connects to a microphone.
- Line Out port (lime). This port connects to a headphone or a speaker. In the 4-channel and 6-channel configurations, the function of this port becomes Front Speaker Out.

2.7.2 Internal connectors

1. Chassis fan connector (4-pin SYS_FAN1)

Connect the fan cable to the fan connector on the motherboard, ensuring that the black wire of each cable matches the ground pin of the connector.




EMB-APL1 Fan connector



CAUTION: DO NOT forget to connect the fan cable to the fan connector. Insufficient air flow inside the system may damage the motherboard components. This is not a jumper! DO NOT place a jumper cap on the fan connector.


2. Embedded DisplayPort (40-pin EDP1)

This connector is for an internal embedded DisplayPort connection.



3. DCIN AUX power connector (4-pin DC_PWR2)


This port connects to a DCIN AUX supply plug. The power supply plug is designed to fit this connector in only one orientation. Find the proper orientation and push down firmly until the connector completely fits.

4. System panel connector (10-1 pin F_PANEL1)

This connector supports several chassis-mounted functions.

• System power LED (2-pin +PWR_LED-)

This 2-pin connector is for the system power LED. Connect the chassis power LED cable to this connector. The system power LED lights up when you turn on the system power, and blinks when the system is in sleep mode.

Hard disk drive activity LED (2-pin +HDD_LED-)

This 2-pin connector is for the HDD Activity LED. Connect the HDD Activity LED cable to this connector. The IDE LED lights up or flashes when data is read from or written to the HDD.

• ATX power button/soft-off button (2-pin PWR_BTN)


This 2-pin connector is for the system power button.

Reset button (2-pin RESET)

This 2-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted reset button for system reboot without turning off the system power.

5. Serial ATA 6.0Gb/s connector (7-pin SATA6G_1~2)


These connectors connect to Serial ATA 6.0 Gb/s hard disk drives via Serial ATA 6.0 Gb/s signal cables.

6. USB 2.0 connectors (10-pin USB2_P1, USB2_P2)

These connectors are for USB 2.0 ports. Connect the USB module cable to any of these connectors, then install the module to a slot opening at the back of the system chassis. These USB connectors comply with USB 2.0 specification that supports up to 480 Mbps connection speed.



EMB-APL1 USB2.0 connectors



7. LVDS connector (40-pin LVDS1)


This connector is for an LCD monitor that supports Low-voltage differential signaling (LVDS) interface.




EMB-APL1 LVDS connector

8. SPI programming connector (8-pin SPI1)

Use this connector to flash BIOS SPI ROM.






9. M.2 socket 3

The M2E1 socket allows you to install a PCIe interface M.2 (NGFF) E Key module.

The M2M1 socket allows you to install a SATA interface M.2 (NGFF) M Key SSD module.




EMB-APL1 M.2 sockets

10. Digital I/O connector (10-pin DIO1)

This connector includes 8 I/O lines (In/Out programmable). All of the Digital I/O lines are programmable and each I/O pin can be individually programmed to support various devices.




EMB-APL1 Digital I/O connector

11. PS/2 keyboard/mouse connector (6-pin KBMS1)


This connector is for an IBM PS/2-compatible keyboard and mouse.

12. SATA power connector (4-pin SATA_PWR1)


This connector is for the SATA power cable. The power cable plug is designed to fit this connector in only one orientation. Find the proper orientation and push down firmly until the connector completely fit.

Connect the backlight inverter power cable to this connector.




EMB-APL1 Backlight inverter power connector

14. Serial port connectors (10-pin COM1~6)

These connectors are for serial (COM) ports. Connect the serial port module cable to this connector, then install the module to a slot opening at the back of the system chassis.



EMB-APL1 Serial port connectors





Chapter 3 BIOS setup

3.1 BIOS setup

Use the BIOS Setup to update the BIOS or configure settings. The BIOS screens include navigation keys and help to guide you in using the BIOS Setup program.

Entering BIOS Setup at startup

To enter BIOS Setup at startup:

Press <Delete> during the Power-On Self Test (POST). If you do not press <Delete>, POST continues with its routine.

Entering BIOS Setup after POST

To enter BIOS Setup after POST:

- Press <Ctrl>+<Alt>+ simultaneously.
- Press the reset button on the system chassis.
- Press the power button to turn the system off then back on. Do this option only if you failed to enter BIOS Setup using the first two options.



NOTE: Using the power button, reset button, or the <Ctrl>+<Alt>+ keys to reboot a running operating system can cause damage to your data or system. Always shut down the system properly from the operating system.



IMPORTANT:

- The default BIOS settings for this motherboard apply to most working conditions and ensures optimal performance. If the system becomes unstable after changing any BIOS settings, load the default settings to regain system stability. Select the option **Restore Defaults** under the Save & Exit Menu. See section **3.7 Save & Exit Menu**.
- If the system fails to boot after changing any BIOS setting, try to clear the CMOS and reset the motherboard to the default value. See section 2.6 Jumpers for information on how to erase the RTC RAM.

Menu bar

The menu bar on top of the screen has the following main items:

Main	For changing the basic system configuration.
Advanced	For changing the advanced system settings.
Chipset	For viewing and changing chipset settings.
Security	For setting up BIOS security settings.
Boot	For changing the system boot configuration.
Save & Exit	For selecting the exit options and loading default settings.

To select an item on the menu bar, press the right or left arrow key on the keyboard until the desired item is highlighted.

3.2 Main menu

The Main menu provides you an overview of the basic system information, and allows you to set the system date and time.

3.2.1 System Date [Day MM/DD/YYYY]

Allows you to set the system date.

3.2.2 System Time [HH:MM:SS]

Allows you to set the system time.

3.3 Advanced menu

The Advanced menu items allow you to change the settings for the CPU and other system devices.



Be cautious when changing the settings of the Advanced menu items. Incorrect field values can cause the system to malfunction.

3.3.1 Trusted Computing

Security Device Support [Enable]

Allows you to enable or disable BIOS support for security devices. Configuration options: [Disable] [Enable]

3.3.2 CPU Configuration

The items in this menu show CPU-related information.

Intel Virtualization Technology [Enabled]

[Enabled]	Allows a hardware platform to run multiple operating systems separately and simultaneously, enabling one system to virtually function as several systems.
[Disabled]	Disables this function.

VT-d [Enabled]

Allows you to enable or disable the CPU VT-d function. Configuration options: [Enabled] [Disabled]

Power Limit 1 Enable [Enabled]

Allows you to enable or disable Power Limit 1. Configuration options: [Enabled] [Disabled]

Power Limit 1 Clamp Mode [Enabled]

Allows you to enable or disable Power Limit 1 Clamp Mode. Configuration options: [Enabled] [Disabled]

Power Limit 1 Power [Auto]

Allows you to set Power Limit 1 in watts. When Auto is selected, Power Limit 1 is decided by the default silicon support value. Configuration options: [Auto] [6] ~ [25]

Power Limit 1 Time Window [Auto]

Allows you to set Power Limit 1 Time Window in seconds. When Auto is selected, Power Limit 1 Time Window is decided by the default silicon support value. Configuration options: [Auto] [1] [2] [3] [4] [5] [6] [7] [8] [10] [12] [14] [16] [20] [24] [28] [32] [40] [48] [56] [64] [80] [96] [112] [128]

3.3.3 SATA Configuration

While entering Setup, the BIOS automatically detects the presence of SATA devices. The SATA Port items show **Not Installed** if no SATA device is installed to the corresponding SATA port.

Chipset SATA [Enable]

Allows you to enable or disable the chipset SATA controller. Configuration options: [Enable] [Disable]

3.3.4 USB Configuration

The items in this menu allow you to change the USB-related features.

The USB Devices item shows the auto-detected values. If no USB device is detected, the item shows $\ensuremath{\text{None}}$

Legacy USB Support [Enabled]

[Enabled]	Enables the support for USB devices on legacy operating systems (OS).		
[Disabled]	The USB devices can be used only for the BIOS setup program.		
[Auto]	Allows the system to detect the presence of USB devices at startup. If detected, the USB controller legacy mode is enabled. If no USB device is detected, the legacy USB support is disabled.

3.5 Security menu

Restore Defaults

Save or restore User Defaults to all setup options.
