## 2.1 Before you proceed

Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.



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#### CAUTION!

- Unplug the power cord from the wall socket before touching any component.
- Before handling components, use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safely grounded object or a metal object, such as the power supply case, to avoid damaging them due to static electricity.
- Hold components by the edges to avoid touching the ICs on them.
- Whenever you uninstall any component, place it on a grounded antistatic pad or in the bag that came with the component.
- Before you install or remove any component, ensure that the ATX power supply is switched off or the power cord is detached from the power supply. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to the motherboard, peripherals, or components.

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
## 2.2 Motherboard layout

**CAUTION!** Do not overtighten the screws! Doing so can damage the motherboard.

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


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## 2.4 Central Processing Unit (CPU)

This motherboard comes with an Intel<sup>®</sup> 7th/ 6th Generation Core™ i7 / i5 / i3, Pentium<sup>®</sup> and Celeron<sup>®</sup> 14nm LGA 1151 socket processor.

**IMPORTANT:** Unplug all power cables before installing the CPU.



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#### CAUTION!

- Upon purchase of the motherboard, ensure that the PnP cap is on the socket and the socket contacts are not bent. Contact your retailer immediately if the PnP cap is missing, or if you see any damage to the PnP cap/socket contacts/motherboard components.
- Keep the cap after installing the motherboard. The manufacturer will process Return Merchandise Authorization (RMA) requests only if the motherboard comes with the cap on the LGA1151 socket.
- The product warranty does not cover damage to the socket contacts resulting from incorrect CPU installation/removal, or misplacement/loss/ incorrect removal of the PnP cap.




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



IMBA-H110A 288-pin DDR4 DIMM sockets

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

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

## 2.6 Jumpers

#### 1. Clear RTC RAM (3-pin CLRTC1)

This jumper allows you to clear the Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM in CMOS. You can clear the CMOS memory of system setup parameters by erasing the CMOS RTC RAM data. The onboard button cell battery powers the RAM data in CMOS, which include system setup information such as system passwords.



#### IMBA-H110A Clear RTC RAM

#### To erase the RTC RAM:

- 1. Turn OFF the computer and unplug the power cord.
- Move the jumper cap from pins 1-2 (default) to pins 2-3. Keep the cap on pins 2-3 for about 5~10 seconds, then move the cap back to pins 1-2.
- 3. Plug the power cord and turn ON the computer.
- Hold down the <Del> key during the boot process and enter BIOS setup to reenter data.



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
**CAUTION!** Except when clearing the RTC RAM, never remove the cap on CLRTC jumper default position. Removing the cap will cause system boot failure!



#### NOTES:

- If the steps above do not help, remove the onboard battery and move the jumper again to clear the CMOS RTC RAM data. After clearing the CMOS, reinstall the battery.
- You do not need to clear the RTC when the system hangs due to overclocking. For system failure due to overclocking, use the CPU Parameter Recall (C.P.R) feature. Shut down and reboot the system so the BIOS can automatically reset parameter settings to default values.







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#### 5. Chassis intrusion jumper (4-1 pin CHASSIS)

This connector is for a chassis-mounted intrusion detection sensor or switch. Connect one end of the chassis intrusion sensor or switch cable to this connector. The chassis intrusion sensor or switch sends a high-level signal to this connector when a chassis component is removed or replaced. The signal is then generated as a chassis intrusion event.

Move the jumper cap to pins 1-2 when you intend to use the chassis intrusion detection feature.

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
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
## 2.7 Connectors

### 2.7.1 Rear panel connectors



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- 1. PS/2 mouse port (green). This port is for a PS/2 mouse.
- 2. USB 2.0 ports. These 9-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports connect to USB 2.0 devices.
- 3. DisplayPort. This port is for a DisplayPort-compatible devices.
- 4. Serial port (COM port). This port connects to a modem, or other device that conforms with serial specification.



 LAN (RJ-45) ports. These ports allow Gigabit connection to a Local Area Network (LAN) through a network hub. Refer to the table below for the LAN port LED indications.

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- 6. Line In port (light blue). This port connects the tape, CD, DVD player, or other audio sources.
- Line Out port (lime). This port connects to a headphone or a speaker. In a 4.1-channel and 5.1-channel configurations, the function of this port becomes Front Speaker Out.
- 8. Microphone port (pink). This port connects to a microphone.



**NOTE:** Refer to the audio configuration table below for the function of the audio ports in the 2.1, 4.1 or 5.1-channel configuration.

9. USB 3.0 ports. These 9-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports connect to USB 3.0/2.0 devices.



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
#### NOTES:

- DO NOT connect a keyboard / mouse to any USB 3.0 port when installing a Windows<sup>®</sup> operating system.
- Windows<sup>®</sup> 7 requires USB 3.0 driver to use USB 3.0 devices.
- We strongly recommend that you connect USB 3.0 devices to USB 3.0 ports for a faster and better performance from your USB 3.0 devices.
- 10. Video Graphics Adapter (VGA) port. This 15-pin port is for a VGA monitor or other VGA-compatible devices.
- HDMI port. This port is for a High-Definition Multimedia Interface (HDMI) connectors, and is HDCP compliant allowing playback of HD DVD, Blu-Ray, and other protected content.
- 12. **PS/2 keyboard port (purple)**. This port is for a PS/2 keyboard.

### 2.7.2 Internal connectors

#### 1. ATX power connectors (24-pin EATX\_PWR1, 8-pin EATX\_PWR2)

These connectors are for ATX power supply plugs. The power supply plugs are designed to fit these connectors in only one orientation. Find the proper orientation and push down firmly until the connectors completely fit.



IMBA-H110A ATX power connectors




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#### IMPORTANT:

- For a fully configured system, we recommend that you use a power supply unit (PSU) that complies with ATX 12 V Specification 2.0 (or later version) and provides a minimum power of 230W.
- We recommend that you use a PSU with higher power output when configuring a system with more power-consuming devices. The system may become unstable or may not boot up if the power is inadequate.

#### 2. Speaker out connector (4-pin AMP\_CON)

The 4-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted speaker.



IMBA-H110A Audio Stere. Output with Amp connector



#### 3. Chassis / CPU fan connectors (4-pin CHA\_FAN1/2, 4-pin CPU\_FAN1)

Connect the fan cables to the fan connectors on the motherboard, ensuring that the black wire of each cable matches the ground pin of the connector.



IMBA-H110A Fan connectors




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**CAUTION:** Do not forget to connect the fan cables to the fan connectors. Insufficient air flow inside the system may damage the motherboard components. These are not jumpers! Do not place jumper caps on the fan connectors!

#### 4. Serial ATA 6.0Gb/s connectors (7-pin SATA6G\_1~3)

These connectors connect to Serial ATA 6.0 Gb/s hard disk drives via Serial ATA 6.0 Gb/s signal cables.



IMBA-H110A Intel® SATA 6 Gb/s connectors




**IMPORTANT:** When using hot-plug and NCQ, set the SATA Mode Selection item in the BIOS to [AHCI]. See section **3.3.3 SATA Configuration** for details.

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#### 5. USB 2.0 connectors (10-pin USB78 and USB910)

These USB connectors comply with USB 2.0 specifications.

Never connect a 1394 cable to the USB connector. Doing so will damage the motherboard.

- The USB module cable is purchased separately.

To install Windows® 7 in the Skylake platform:


Step1. Use this utility to pack XHCI driver into the original Windows<sup>®</sup> 7 OS image, there will be another OS image released.

Step2. Use the new OS image to install via any device.

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#### 6. BIOS programmable connector (8-pin SPI\_1)

Use this connector to flash the BIOS ROM.




IMBA-H110A BIOS Programmable connector





#### 7. System panel connectors (10-1 pin F\_PANEL)

This connector supports several chassis-mounted functions.

#### System power LED (2-pin PWR\_LED)

This 2-pin connector is for the system power LED. Connect the chassis power LED cable to this connector. The system power LED lights up when you turn on the system power, and blinks when the system is in sleep mode.

#### Hard disk drive activity LED (2-pin HDD\_LED)

This 2-pin connector is for the HDD Activity LED. Connect the HDD Activity LED cable to this connector. The IDE LED lights up or flashes when data is read from or written to the HDD.

#### ATX power button/soft-off button (2-pin PWR\_BTN)

This 2-pin connector is for the system power button.

#### Reset button (2-pin RESET)

This 2-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted reset button for system reboot without turning off the system power.


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These connectors are for serial (COM) ports. Connect the serial port module cable to this connector, then install the module to a slot opening at the back of the system chassis.

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

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#### 9. Digital I/O connector (10-pin DIO)

This connector includes 8 I/O lines (In/Out programmable). All of the Digital I/O lines are programmable and each I/O pin can be individually programmed to support various devices.

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IMBA-H110A Digitial I/O connector



#### 10. M.2 M-Key slot

This socket allows you to install an M.2 (NGFF) SSD module.

- The M.2 SSD module is purchased separately.
- The M.2 M-key slot supports type 2280 SATA devices.

**BIOS setup** 

## 3.1 BIOS setup

Use the BIOS Setup to update the BIOS or configure settings. The BIOS screens include navigation keys and help to guide you in using the BIOS Setup program.

#### **Entering BIOS Setup at startup**

#### To enter BIOS Setup at startup:

Press <Delete> during the Power-On Self Test (POST). If you do not press <Delete>, POST continues with its routine.

#### **Entering BIOS Setup after POST**

#### To enter BIOS Setup after POST:

- Press <Ctrl>+<Alt>+<Del> simultaneously.
- Press the reset button on the system chassis.
- Press the power button to turn the system off then back on. Do this option only
  if you failed to enter BIOS Setup using the first two options.



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**NOTE:** Using the power button, reset button, or the <Ctrl>+<Alt>+<Del> keys to reboot a running operating system can cause damage to your data or system. Always shut down the system properly from the operating system.



#### IMPORTANT:

- The default BIOS settings for this motherboard apply to most working conditions and ensures optimal performance. If the system becomes unstable after changing any BIOS settings, load the default settings to regain system stability. Select the option **Restore Defaults** under the Save & Exit Menu. See section **3.7 Save & Exit Menu**.
- The BIOS setup items described in this section are for reference purposes only, and may not exactly match what you see on your screen.

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Chapter 3: BIOS setup

#### Menu bar

The menu bar on top of the screen has the following main items:

Main	For changing the basic system configuration.
Advanced	For changing the advanced system settings.
Chipset	For viewing and changing chipset settings.
Security	For setting up BIOS security settings.
Boot	For changing the system boot configuration.
Save & Exit	For selecting the exit options and loading default settings.

To select an item on the menu bar, press the right or left arrow key on the keyboard until the desired item is highlighted.

## 3.2 Main menu

The Main menu provides you an overview of the basic system information, and allows you to set the system date, time, language, and security settings.

## 3.2.1 System Date [Day MM/DD/YYYY]

Allows you to set the system date.

## 3.2.2 System Time [HH:MM:SS]

Allows you to set the system time.

## 3.3 Advanced menu

The Advanced menu items allow you to change the settings for the CPU and other system devices.



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Be cautious when changing the settings of the Advanced menu items. Incorrect field values can cause the system to malfunction.

#### Case Open Warning [Disabled]

Allows you to enable or disable case open warning function. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled] [Clear]

## 3.3.1 CPU Configuration

The items in this menu show CPU-related information the BIOS automatically detects.



The items shown in the submenu may be different depending on the type of CPU installed.

#### Hyper-threading [Enabled]

The Intel Hyper-Threading Technology allows a hyper-threading processor to appear as two logical processors to the operating system, allowing the operating system to schedule two threads or processes simultaneously.

 [Enabled]
 Two threads per activated core are enabled.

 [Disabled]
 Only one thread per activated core is enabled.

#### Intel (VMX) Virtualization Technology [Enabled]

[Enabled] Allows a hardware platform to run multiple operating systems separately and simultaneously, enabling one system to virtually function as several systems.

[Disabled] Disables this function.

#### Active Processor Cores [All]

Allows you to choose the number of CPU cores to activate in each processor package. Configuration options: [All] [1] [2] [3]



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Configuration options for active processor cores are dependent on the installed CPU.

#### Security Device Support [Enable]

Allows you to enable or disable BIOS support for security devices. Configuration options: [Disable] [Enable]

#### SHA-1 PCR Bank [Enabled]

Allows you to enable or disable SHA-1 PCR Bank. Configuration options: [Enabled] [Disabled]

#### SHA256 PCR Bank [Enabled]

Allows you to enable or disable SHA256 PCR Bank. Configuration options: [Enabled] [Disabled]

#### Pending operation [None]

Allows you to schedule an operation for security devices. Reboot your system for the changes to take effect. Configuration options: [None] [TPM Clear]

Allows you to select the TCG2 spec version support.

#### Physical Presence Spec Version [1.3]


