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Chapter 2

Motherboard information

2.1 Before you proceed

Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.



CAUTION!

- Unplug the power cord from the wall socket before touching any component.
- Before handling components, use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safely grounded object or a metal object, such as the power supply case, to avoid damaging them due to static electricity.
- · Hold components by the edges to avoid touching the ICs on them.
- Whenever you uninstall any component, place it on a grounded antistatic pad or in the bag that came with the component.
- Before you install or remove any component, ensure that the ATX power supply is switched off or the power cord is detached from the power supply.
 Failure to do so may cause severe damage to the motherboard, peripherals, or components.






Place four screws into the holes indicated by circles to secure the motherboard to the chassis.



Do not overtighten the screws! Doing so can damage the motherboard.





2.6 Jumpers

1. Clear RTC RAM jumper (3-pin CLRTC)

This jumper allows you to clear the Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM in CMOS. You can clear the CMOS memory of system setup parameters by erasing the CMOS RTC RAM data. The onboard button cell battery powers the RAM data in CMOS, which include system setup information such as system passwords.



To erase the RTC RAM:

- 1. Turn OFF the computer and unplug the power cord.
- 2. Move the jumper cap from pins 1-2 (default) to pins 2-3. Keep the cap on pins 2-3 for about 5~10 seconds, then move the cap back to pins 1-2.
- 3. Plug the power cord and turn ON the computer.
- 4. Hold down the **** key during the boot process and enter BIOS setup to reenter data.



Except when clearing the RTC RAM, never remove the cap on CLRTC jumper default position. Removing the cap will cause system boot failure!




- If the steps above do not help, remove the onboard battery and move the jumper again to clear the CMOS RTC RAM data. After clearing the CMOS, reinstall the battery.
- You do not need to clear the RTC when the system hangs due to overclocking. For system failure due to overclocking, use the CPU Parameter Recall (C.P.R) feature. Shut down and reboot the system so the BIOS can automatically reset parameter settings to default values.

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2. Chassis Intrusion jumper (4-1 pin CHASSIS)


This connector is for a chassis-mounted intrusion detection sensor or switch. Connect one end of the chassis intrusion sensor or switch cable to this connector. The chassis intrusion sensor or switch sends a high-level signal to this connector when a chassis component is removed or replaced. The signal is then generated as a chassis intrusion event.

Move the jumper cap to pins 1-2 when you intend to use the chassis intrusion detection feature.





2.7 Connectors

2.7.1 Rear panel connectors



- 1. **DC power connector.** Insert the power adapter into this port.
- HDMI® port. This port is for High-Definition Multimedia Interface (HDMI®)
 connectors, and is HDCP compliant allowing playback of HD DVD, Blu-ray,
 and other protected content.
- Video Graphics Adapter (VGA) port. This 15-pin port is for a VGA monitor or other VGA-compatible devices.
- 4. Serial port connector (COM). This port connects a modem, or other devices that conform with serial specification.
- 5. USB 3.2 Gen 2 ports (Teal Blue, Type-A). These 9-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports connect to USB 3.2 Gen 2 devices.



We strongly recommend that you connect USB 3.2 Gen 2 devices to USB 3.2 Gen 2 ports for a faster and better performance from your USB 3.2 Gen 2 devices.

6. USB 2.0 ports. These two 4-pin Universal Serial Bus (USB) ports are available for connecting USB 2.0/1.1 devices.



Before you install Windows® 7 operating system, go to BIOS Setup > Advanced > XHCI mode [Disabled], USB 2.0 (EHCI) support [Enabled], and set them back when you finish installing the operating system.

 2.5G Ethernet ports. These ports allow 2.5Gbps Ethernet connection to a Local Area Network (LAN) through a network hub. Refer to the table below for the Ethernet port LED indications.




1. ATX Power connector (4-pin EATX_PWR1)

2. Battery connector (2-pin BATT1)


This connector is for the lithium CMOS battery.



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3. M.2 M Key slots (M2M1, M2B1)

These slot allow you to install M.2 modules.






- The M.2 SSD module is purchased separately.
- The M.2 M Key slot supports type 2280 PCIe 3.0 x2 (Gen3) NVMe storage devices.

4. Chassis Fan header (4-pin SYS_FAN1)

Connect the fan cable to the fan header on the motherboard, ensuring that the black wire of each cable matches the ground pin of the header.






Do not forget to connect the fan cable to the fan header. Insufficient air flow inside the system may damage the motherboard components. It is not a jumper! Do not place the jumper cap on the fan header!

5. LVDS connector (40-pin LVDS)


This connector is for an LCD monitor that supports Low-Voltage Differential Signaling (LVDS) interface.



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6. Backlight Inverter Power connector (5-pin INV)

Connect the backlight inverter power cable to this connector.






The backlight inverter power connector supports 1A current to the maximum.

7. SATA Power header (4-pin SATA_PWR)

This header is for the SATA power cable. The power cable plug is designed to fit this header in only one orientation. Find the proper orientation and push down firmly until the header completely fit.






The SATA power header supports 1A current to the maximum.

8. SATA 6.0Gb/s port (7-pin SATA1)

This port connects to a Serial ATA 6.0 Gb/s hard disk drive via a Serial ATA 6.0 Gb/s signal cable.






When using hot-plug and NCQ, set the SATA Mode Selection item in the BIOS to [AHCI]. See section 3.3.3 SATA Configuration for details.

9. Digital I/O header (10-pin DIO)

This header includes 8 I/O lines (In/Out programmable). All of the Digital I/O lines are programmable and each I/O pin can be individually programmed to support various devices.






To configure the I/O pins in BIOS, go to the Advanced tab > Digital IO Port Configuration. See section 3.3.11 Digital IO Port Configuration for details.

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10. System Panel header (10-1 pin F_PANEL)

This header supports several chassis-mounted functions.



System power LED (2-pin PWR LED)

This 2-pin header is for the system power LED. Connect the chassis power LED cable to this header. The system power LED lights up when you turn on the system power, and blinks when the system is in sleep mode.

Hard disk drive activity LED (2-pin HDD_LED)

This 2-pin header is for the HDD Activity LED. Connect the HDD Activity LED cable to this header. The IDE LED lights up or flashes when data is read from or written to the HDD.

ATX power button/soft-off button (2-pin PWR_BTN)


This 2-pin header is for the system power button.

Reset button (2-pin RESET)

This 2-pin header is for the chassis-mounted reset button for system reboot without turning off the system power.

11. COM Port headers (10-pin COM1~6)

These headers are for serial (COM) ports. Connect the serial port module cables to these header, then install the modules to slot openings at the back of the system chassis.



12. Debug Card connector (DBG1)



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13. SIM Card slot (10-pin SIM_CARD1)



Use this slot to connect Minicard readers.



This header is for a chassis-mounted front panel audio I/O module that supports HD Audio audio standard. Connect one end of the front panel audio I/O module cable to this header.






We recommend that you connect a high-definition front panel audio module to this connector to avail of the motherboard's high-definition audio capability.

The 4-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted speaker.



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Chapter 3

BIOS Setup

3.1 BIOS Setup

Use the BIOS Setup to configure settings. The BIOS screens include navigation keys and help to guide you in using the BIOS Setup program.

Entering BIOS Setup at startup

To enter BIOS Setup at startup:

Press <Delete> during the Power-On Self Test (POST). If you do not press <Delete>, POST continues with its routine.

Entering BIOS Setup after POST

To enter BIOS Setup after POST:

- Press <Ctrl>+<Alt>+ simultaneously.
- Press the reset button on the system chassis.
- Press the power button to turn the system off then back on. Do this option only
 if you failed to enter BIOS Setup using the first two options.



Using the power button, reset button, or the <Ctrl>+<Alt>+ keys to reboot a running operating system can cause damage to your data or system. Always shut down the system properly from the operating system.



- The default BIOS settings for this motherboard apply to most working
 conditions and ensures optimal performance. If the system becomes
 unstable after changing any BIOS settings, load the default settings to
 regain system stability. Select the option Restore Defaults under the Save
 & Exit Menu. See section 3.7 Save & Exit Menu.
- If the system fails to boot after changing any BIOS setting, try to clear the CMOS and reset the motherboard to the default value. See section 2.6 Jumpers for information on how to erase the RTC RAM.

Menu bar

The menu bar on top of the screen has the following main items:

MainFor changing the basic system configuration.AdvancedFor changing the advanced system settings.ChipsetFor viewing and changing chipset settings.SecurityFor setting up BIOS security settings.

Boot For changing the system boot configuration.

Save & Exit For selecting the exit options and loading default settings.

To select an item on the menu bar, press the right or left arrow key on the keyboard until the desired item is highlighted.

3.2 Main menu

The Main menu provides you an overview of the basic system information, and allows you to set the system date and time.

3.2.1 System Date [Day MM/DD/YYYY]

Allows you to set the system date.

3.2.2 System Time [HH:MM:SS]

Allows you to set the system time.

3.3 Advanced menu

The Advanced menu items allow you to change the settings for the CPU and other system devices.



Be cautious when changing the settings of the Advanced menu items. Incorrect field values can cause the system to malfunction.

Case Open Warning [Disabled]

Allows you to enable or disable case open warning function. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled] [Clear]

3.3.1 CPU Configuration

The items in this menu show CPU-related information the BIOS automatically

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detects.



The items shown in the submenu may be different depending on the type of CPU installed.

Hyper-threading [Enabled]

The Intel Hyper-Threading Technology allows a hyper-threading processor to appear as two logical processors to the operating system, allowing the operating system to schedule two threads or processes simultaneously.

[Enabled] Two threads per activated core are enabled.
[Disabled] Only one thread per activated core is enabled.

Intel (VMX) Virtualization Technology [Enabled]

[Enabled] Allows a hardware platform to run multiple operating systems

separately and simultaneously, enabling one system to

virtually function as several systems.

[Disabled] Disables this function.

3.3.2 Trusted Computing

Security Device Support [Enable]

Allows you to enable or disable BIOS support for security devices. Configuration options: [Disable] [Enable]
